14-YEAR-OLD LAUREN MCLAVY

“DREAMS A DREAM”: PERFORMING IN THE WEST END!



I meet Lauren at home, where her mum Liz is busy preparing an early dinner. She will soon have to get ready for her singing class in Dartford, which is just one of the many activities the 14-year-old is involved in on a weekly basis. She is chasing a dream, performing at the West End, and to get there she needs to work hard. Or in the words of her mum: “She has to be determined! And of course enjoy what she is doing at the same time!”

We sit down on a comfy sofa in the conservatory and start chatting.

So tell me, who is Lauren?

“I am a 14-year-old girl who enjoys school. I do a lot of things outside of school too, including dancing and singing. I live at home with my dad, mum and two older sisters Heather (21) and Jodie (20).

I do get on with my sisters most of the time! My dad always says that he never ‘wanted’ any sons: he is very happy to have three girls!”

How would your friends describe you?

“I think they would describe me as a kind, up-beat and friendly person.”

What school do you go to and what’s your favourite subject?

“I go to St Georges School and am currently in year nine. What I love most about school are the people. I’ve got lots of friends. My favourite subject is Sports. I picked it as an option for my GCSE and do both theory and practical. In winter I am involved in netball and during summer we do athletics. I think I am best at running.

Who is your best friend?

“Olivia, who is in the same class as me. We are so alike, we just get each other! We have lots of good times together.”

What do you like doing outside school?

“Dancing! I used to do karate, but I knew it wasn’t for me. I did like the movements though, so that’s how I got into dancing. I was nine-years-old. I started with ballet. Now, I also do tap, modern, lyrical and jazz. I practice four times a week.”

What is so special about dancing?

"Doing a dance that means a lot to you is a really good experience. You might struggle to talk about something, but dance is a way to express yourself."

Your mum is very encouraging of everything you do.

What does your mum mean to you?

"She means a lot to me. She is the most amazing person and puts up with so much. She is always running around for me."

Who is your greatest example?

"Barbra Streisand. She is an actress, dancer and singer in films and shows. This is my dream too. I know I will have to work really hard to get here. When I finish my GCSE I am hoping to go to a musical theatre college."

Why do you come to church?

"I have been coming to church my whole life. It is important for me to stay connected to all the people involved. Church has helped me with my social skills and made me more confident. I talk to people that I wouldn't usually talk to. Church also helps me to stay on the right path, to not drift away. I try to remember Christian values when I dance. To respect everyone I work with and to always be grateful."



What do you like about St Aidan's Church?

"I have been going there my whole life, so it is something really close to me. The people at the church mean a lot to me and have helped me through a lot. My parents got married at St Aidan's and I want to get married there too!"

If you could change anything in church, what would it be?

"The time of the service. A 10.30 start would be the ideal time for me! Also, it would be nice to have fun days and do performing in church. This might encourage my friends to come to church too."

What would you like to do when you grow up?

"My backup plan is teaching History in a secondary school. I love finding out about everything that happened in the past and how different it is to nowadays."

But my main goal is to perform in the West End. I would love to play in Les Miserables. My favourite song in this musical is "I dreamed a dream". My favourite sentence is "Now life has killed the dream I dreamed". This is so sad. I am willing to work really hard to make sure this doesn't happen to me!"

Once again, the folk from St Aidan's (and five from River View Baptist Church) rallied to the call and between us we covered 34 roads for house to house collecting in the parish and raised £1,426.50.

No one particularly enjoys the experience but raising that fantastic amount makes it all worthwhile – yes, even getting soaked on the Thursday evening! The interest in jumble sales seems to be waning. We



had a lovely lot of really good items to sell, but sadly very few people came to buy – consequently we raised only £188.68. We have kept aside several bags of good quality warm clothes to send to Romania with the shoe box appeal at Christmas, and the British Heart Foundation collected the rest of the unsold items for their charity shops, so nothing was wasted.

The coffee and cake morning with the plant and bring & buy sale was very well attended – everyone seemed to enjoy themselves and the weather was good – many sitting in the garden watching the children play. £336.70 was raised as a result.

Rudo, Janet and Wendy also successfully completed the Meopham Sponsored Walk, and between them raised £304.

A further £111.11. was given in donations – making the total raised in our parish to £2,366.99.

So a huge thank you to all who worked so hard, and to those who contributed financially. It is wonderful to know that as a result of our efforts for just one week of the year, many people's lives will be vastly improved.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

CATHERINE BERRY VOLUNTEERS AT THE FOODBANK

As a church we want to 'share God's love in the community', but what does this mean in practice? Catherine shares how she decided to serve God through volunteering at our local foodbank.

"I began volunteering for the Gravesham Foodbank in August 2014. This came about after a few years of feeling that I wanted to do more to serve God in the wider community. I had worked for a Children's Centre for several years and had experience of children coming to nursery appearing very hungry and when speaking to their parent's had found they were struggling financially to buy basic food supplies."

A little courage

"I felt strongly that sadly there was a real need for the Foodbanks and that I wanted to find out more. It took several months of research, thinking, praying and putting off sending an email until I finally plucked up the courage to make contact with the Gravesham Foodbank.

I arranged to go and visit the Foodbank hub at Gravesend Methodist Church as it is open every Saturday morning and this is the one day I was free to volunteer. I met Eric Davies, the manager of the hub, and he explained about the Trussell Trust charity and how the Foodbank hubs work in Gravesend. I made the decision there and then to complete the volunteer application forms and a month later I began my first Saturday volunteering.

I have been involved in bagging up food, taking food to clients and sorting food donations. Clients are given food supplies for three days if they have a red voucher given to them by different agencies and organisations they come into contact with. If a client has no red voucher they can receive basic emergency supplies."

Looking back at my first year of volunteering

"How have I found that first year? I've met many new and interesting people who volunteer from local churches and also some who do not belong to a church. I've bagged up food for families, single people, the homeless, single parents, old and young.

I've had to think about foods that do not need cooking for those with no cooking facilities, food that can be 'cooked' only using a kettle, bagging up food for someone who has to use walking sticks, making sure that tinned food has only ring pulls as a client has no access to a tin-opener and many other needs.



Regardless of the political issues surrounding the need for Foodbanks, I have seen that for most people the simple act of someone offering them a cup of tea or coffee, a listening ear, and a place to sit and talk about their situation seems to be of great help and support for many. It is not about judging people."

Blessed while being a blessing

"I wanted to do this to feel I was 'giving something back' to my local community but the biggest surprise was that on weeks when I have felt life has seemed particularly difficult, I have found just two hours helping at the Foodbank has helped me put my own problems in perspective.

The simple task of bagging up food for people who really need it has felt like a real service in the community and I've regularly thanked God for all I have got in my own life and that 'the steadfast love of the Lord' truly never ceases. It has helped remind me of how the simplest things in life, food, running water, a roof over my head, somewhere to call home, financial security and the love of family and friends are so important and how for some people these things seem so far away."

Being bold has given me so much in return

"I'm not naturally always the most confident in new situations but sometimes I am amazed at how God gives us the strength (as the songwriter put it), to 'Be Bold, Be strong, for the Lord your God is with you' and I truly feel that taking that step into doing something new has been worth it in more ways than I could have imagined.

Please continue to donate food and other items as listed in the newsheet every week. Your support is very much needed and appreciated. MEET JANET SCOTT-MANGA (52)

My name is Janet Hannah Scott-Manga and I am 52 years and 9 months old. Born and raised in the Bo district, Southern province of Sierra Leone, West Africa. I am the 7th child of 20. I class myself as one of the lucky few in the world to be raised in a polygamous home where harmony, respect, love and peace was the doctrine even after the death of our father and most recently our first mother.

When and why did you move to Gravesend?

Having spent twenty years in London, I moved to Gravesend in 2005 because my visiting brothers and sisters were tired of having to spend time in the nearby hotels whenever they visited me. I must admit, although the house was affordable, it took me seven years to settle in Gravesend as everyone I know lives in London. I like the peace and quiet (sometimes) and it further made sense when I started work in Gravesend and most of all when I joined the Christian Aid Charity fundraising Walk.

What do you do in your daily life?

I am a social worker by profession with management responsibility to support and oversee the practice of care management practitioners in Kent. I am also a certified Deprivation of Liberty Best Interest Assessor – which basically means I assess people whose liberty may have been breached or be about to be breached to ensure that any such decision is the least restrictive and in line with the law.

What's your favourite season of the year?

My favourite season in the UK is Autumn, as it is not too cold and not too hot (though I should probably say the same for Summer!!)

What's your favourite day of the week?

Friday of course. At work there is never a dull moment while the end of the day is also very welcome as it is the start of the weekend.

If you could invite anyone for dinner, dead or alive, who would you take?

As I am limited to one, I will take my friend to share whatever experience of fine dining with her.

What do you do when you cannot sleep?

I hardly get a sleepless night (always exhausted), but in the rare times that I do, I read a novel or catch up with work.



Who do you talk to on the phone most often?

My two sisters and my girlfriends in London daily and my mothers twice a week. The rest facebook daily.

What would you change if you were Prime Minister for one day?

Eradicate poverty. I am still hopeful that someday it will happen

If you could create anything, what would it be?

A peace ball that, when dropped in a country experiencing unrest, will bring peace.

Football or Rugby?

Rugby. I like the lads.

Eating in or eating out?

Eating in. I love my cooking and I would rather invite or share.

What inspires you in life and why?

Humility, because I believe in the human race and believe that as human beings we have power to effect good in this life.

What does it mean for you to be a Christian?

Love, kindness, tolerance, sharing and faith.

I love my church because...

Because of its diversity, its drive to bring the community together and it is close by my house.

VICAR'S THOUGHTS

For the past two and a half years, Lusa has chaired the Vocations Strategy Group (VSG) of the Church of England (CofE). The VSG is made of a dozen people drawn from around the country whose task is to help the church increase numbers of Minority Ethnic (ME) candidates to ordination. This year, our own diocese of Rochester has seen three ME Anglicans recommended for training; that is one more than the total of the past seven years. The Pilot asked Lusa to share his journey to ordained ministry and tell us why he thinks it is important to have more ME vocations.



As WW1 was claiming thousands of lives around the world, a band of young British men found themselves engaged in a rather different kind of mission in Katanga, the southern province of the then Belgian Congo. In 1915, a small party embarked on a journey from Liverpool to the heart of the African continent in order to evangelise Congolese subjects of the king of Belgium. Out of the many converts, a young woman Ngalula Tshala, my great-grandmother.

I suspect that none of the people involved then ever imagined that, a hundred years on, one of Ngalula's descendants would be serving as a priest in the Church of England.

I grew up in a Christian family and was exposed to church and faith for as long as I can remember. From my mid teenage years I had a sense of wanting to spend the rest of my life 'doing something' for God; with little idea of what that something should look like.

Somehow, I found myself as a theology student in Brussels. Once I'd completed my Masters, I taught RE for a year before being sent to work with the French Church that had been worshipping in the crypt of Canterbury Cathedral since the 16th century. It seemed to me that the 'something' I had been looking for was slowly taking shape.

Living and working in the grounds of Canterbury Cathedral soon gave me a insight in Anglicanism in general, and the Church of England in particular. When the time came for me to explore the way forward in life, it had become evident that my vision of the church had been influenced by my exposure to Anglicanism. Conversations with trusted friends persuaded me to explore whether God might be calling me to serve him in the Church of England. Within a year or so, I was meeting with a Candidates

Panel and was recommended for ministry training. I trained at Cranmer Hall, Durham and was ordained in 2008 in Canterbury Cathedral.

I soon found myself involved in many initiatives to encourage vocations nationally. One thing that became evident to me was the lack of ME representation at all levels of our church structures. Statistics were even more shocking when it came to clergy and senior staff. When the invitation to join the VSG came, I said yes without hesitation.

A friend recently asked me why is it important for the CofE to have more ME people represented in its structures? The obvious answer would be to argue that diversity is a Gospel imperative. Therefore, our church needs to reflect that at all levels of its structure. Besides, recent trends in population growth suggest that we are living in an increasingly diverse society. Inevitably, that will be reflected in the lives of our parishes if we do our job correctly.

Then I think back to those young British men who, a century ago, endeavoured to share the gospel with my people. My great-grandmother became a Christian and raised three sons who all became ministers. They went on to have children who answered the call to Christian ministry, including my own father.

I wonder, what would have my journey of faith looked like if there had not been space for my ancestors to explore God's stirring in their lives? What would have been of my own vocation, if they had not been encouraged to explore theirs? It is vital that we encourage all of God's people to consider whether God is calling them to a special ministry. The opportunities we create for people today will inevitably shape our church tomorrow. Finally, the church cannot reflect society if society is not reflected in the church.
